The project this week aims to provide opportunities for your child to learn more about different viewpoints. Learning may focus on physical viewpoints in terms of what you can see outside of the window at home, what others can see looking into your home and then progress onto personal viewpoints and of others.

<u>Using your senses:</u> Ask your child to pick a window in the house. Ask them to stand there for a few minutes and take a look at what they can see and write or draw them down. Now ask them to try this activity again but this time ask them what they can hear? Write or draw these down. Ask your child to help find a piece of material in the house and then blindfold them. What can they see? Which sense do they use now? Ask them to now cover their ears and look outside the window. What do they hear?

<u>A 'feely bag' - f</u>ind six objects, such as a hairbrush, a tube of toothpaste, a packet of biscuits, an ice cream scoop, a packet of tissues and a wooden spoon. You will also need something to act as a blindfold. Imagine what it would be like if you could never see because you were blind and you had to learn to rely on your other senses instead. Play with a partner and see who guesses most of the objects.

<u>Write a story:</u> Read or listen to 'Jack and the Beanstalk' again. Create a story map like we do in school to create the story from the giants point of view. Include useful story words and adjectives. Think about how you would feel if someone came into your house and took things. What would you do?



<u>Find a place in the house</u>. Look around what they can see. Sketch what they can see. What is on the left hand side of them? What is the right hand side of them? Does it change if they sit in another part of the house? Make a list of all the things and compare.

<u>Plant watching:</u> Plant a bean or sunflower seed and keep a diary of what happens. Predict what will happen. You could also do this with cress if you want to keep the activity on a smaller scale. These could help you to record what happens: <u>Bean Diary Cress Diary Sunflower Diary</u>

<u>Was Jack right</u>: Ask your child if they think it was a good idea for Jack to go into the Giants house. Why? What should he have done? Create a <u>Flipgrid</u> to share your ideas with your teacher.

<u>Writing instructions</u>: Make a set of instructions on how to plant a seed. You could write your instructions or draw them (remember to use arrows to show what comes next). You will need to use a variety of bossy verbs (put, plant, get, pour,etc.) and time connectives (first, next, then, finally...).
